Dwell With Jesus From Pastor Shawn

What is it like to spend time with a really kind person? You know, the kind of person who always seems to see the good in the world and others... The kind of person who always seems to rise above the gossip, pettiness, and quarrelling at your school or workplace... The kind of person that is genuinely kind, actively listens, and is authentically good...

I know what it is like for me. I start to feel a change I didn't anticipate. Suddenly I find myself smiling more and criticizing less. Without my consent, I'm replicating the way they encounter the world and other people. And what always surprises me about the imitation, is that I don't remember inviting the change. It just sort of happens. My mother would say they rubbed off on me.

The problem, of course—which I have noted equally in my life, is that the opposite also tends to be true. As frequently as I subconsciously absorb the good in others, I'm just as prone to imitating the bad. As I wake up to this reality, I feel the obvious need to control who I surround myself with, but even more that that, I'm hearing some of Jesus' parting words to his disciples in the gospel of John in new light.

I imagine this reality about our humanity—that we take on the best and worst in each other—is a part of what led Jesus to remind his disciples that he is the true vine and we are the branches (John 15:5). After all, to unpack this metaphor Jesus doesn't use grounding language, that is, language that invites us to be grounded or rooted in him, but instead uses <u>abiding</u> language. Jesus used language that invites us to live and dwell with and in him.

Dwell With Jesus (continued)

And as we live and dwell with him, Jesus tells us that we can expect three things to happen:

1. We will bear fruit (John 15:5). Bearing fruit is a sign of a tree's life and helps sustain life in those who partake of it. Bearing fruit is also a sign of a tree's purpose. What good is a vine without any grapes? As we dwell with Jesus we find our purpose, and we put forth signs of the life we have in him.

2. We love one another. Abiding in Jesus' love leads to obedience to Jesus' commandments, and what is Jesus' commandment? That we love one another (John 15:12). As we dwell with Jesus, like dwelling with that person we discussed above, we find ourselves taking on their attributes. In Jesus' case, we find ourselves loving our neighbors as Jesus loves.

3. We experience joy (John 15:11). As we abide with Jesus his joy becomes our joy.

If we know that we are formed by the people we spend time with, why then wouldn't we immerse ourselves into our relationship with Jesus? Jesus' parting words to his disciples were not focused on their time apart, but on the necessity of continuing to dwell with one another. May we too be formed a little less by our fellow branches, and dwell a little deeper in the vine ourselves, and in so doing may we experience what it is like to have the savior of the world rub off on us... forming us to bear fruit, share love, and produce joy. Jesus said, "Abide in me, as I abide in you." —John 14:4

EPIC FAITH JOURNEY

From Mary Songster-Alpin

I have an anniversary coming up. No it isn't my wedding anniversary – although that one – the big 25 - is just around the corner on July 3rd. The anniversary that I am talking about, though, is a totally different anniversary. You see on March 15^{th} , it was 6 months since I crossed the finish line at Ironman Louisville in Kentucky. At precisely 8 am on October 15^{th} , I jumped into the Ohio River to start what would be one of the hardest journeys of my life – an intense, exhausting, exciting, mind-numbing, bone-chilling epic 16 ½ hour 140.6 mile race of



swimming, biking and with nearly running 3000 other equally determined and/or stupid athletes. When it was all said and done, I "ran" (more like stumbled and pretended to run) across the finish line at 12:36 am on October 16th and promptly collapsed into the arms of my "catcher", a volunteer whose specific job it was to catch exhausted. sweaty, numb, comatose ath-

letes. Imagine having a race so epic and exhausting that you have to station volunteers at the finish line to literally "catch" the athletes at the end. That tells you just how *huge* this race was – in sheer size and in requirements for determination and will power.

So, you would think that after that description, my entire existence now would be centered around the fact that I am now an IRONMAN!!! After all, I have never done anything like it and likely won't ever again. I should be the center of attention, the star. I was ready to sign autographs, make book deals, star in media appearances, you name it.... Actually no -I certainly didn't attain star status after all - life, in fact, quickly went back to normal. I do have the tshirt, the hat, the backpack, the Facebook page, the Instagram account, the glass display hanging up in my living room and heck I even have the tattoo. But unless you saw those things, you wouldn't know that I successfully completed an Ironman triathlon. Even if you did see those things, you wouldn't necessarily believe it. I don't look different. I'm still the same old Mary Songster-Alpin - a reasonably fit middle aged working mom and wife and yes triathlete - just a long distance one now. You see if we spend our whole lives thinking that if only we complete that one epic adventure, our lives will be complete and we will magically be fulfilled (and famous), then we are most certainly going to be sorely disappointed. Don't get me wrong – epic adventures are fun and wild and worth all of the work that we put into them. But they won't magically make everything different, better, more complete.

There is one epic adventure, though, that does make a difference in our lives. It is the journey that we as Christians take every day. It isn't glamorous. It isn't expensive. It won't make us famous. It isn't even (usually) earth shattering. But what it is, though, is rewarding and encouraging and fulfilling. After all, what journey can we take throughout our lives in which we never have to worry about being alone? We never have to worry about failing or not making the mid-race cut-offs. We don't have to be strong and fearless and worry about what supplies we have or if we can afford it. We don't have to pretend to be someone we aren't. We don't have to be rich or an extrovert or athletic or talented. We don't have to worry about if our bike will break down or if our wetsuit will rip. We can just be us. We can be us because we will always have Him to pick us up when we falter and dust us off when we fall. We can rebel - we can shout - we can scold - we can ignore and sit down and cry but He will never leave us. He will just wait patiently for us to turn back to Him. He will offer us a shoulder to cry on and a hand to hold. This journey - the journey that we spend our whole lives taking and every day experiencing - our journey with our Lord and Savior - is the journey that truly makes a difference - in our lives and in the lives of everyone around us. By walking with Him, we are more than just us - we are part of this community of believers experiencing a journey unlike no other.

So yes while I am an Ironman and I won't turn down that book deal that I'm sure is coming just around the corner, I am also a Christian and, in my view, that is truly the most epic adventure that we can have. Ever.
